## Experience of the Conference

The emerging evaluator experience at the SAMEA conference was incredibly valuable. I was able to attend a variety of workshops and sessions on topics I had not been exposed to before (e.g. evaluation consulting, systems thinking, big data, social media analysis). It broadened my thinking around what a career in Monitoring & Evaluation could look like.

The experience also gave me a new network of contacts and support in the industry. M&E tends to exist as a part of organizations but with no connection to broader research communities outside of industry specific interests (e.g. HIV/AIDS, Agriculture etc). This frustration was repeated by many individuals I met at the conference and SAMEA has become a forum for cross-industry collaboration, allowing people to exchange tools and ideas developed for the health, education, social policy, agriculture, environmental and technology sectors. It showed me how translatable M&E skills are to various sectors, including corporate social investment, ICT4D and business analysis.

As a monitoring and evaluation professional with 2 years experience I felt that this was an opportune time to attend the conference, I had enough experience to take full advantage of the connections and sessions but with space to learn a lot more. It has reinforced my resolve to be involved in the growth of SAMEA, including the focus on EvalYouth and emerging evaluator programmes. As an M&E professional at an NGO, my experience and interests lie with the monitoring side, specifically setting up M&E systems, identifying the right data management tools and technology and in-depth performance monitoring for programmes team. Coming from the NGO world, I would have benefitted from having more NGOs there, especially small-medium sized NGOs that are just starting to understand the need to invest in monitoring systems.
